## **CASCWA's Delta Section President's Message**

Dear CASCWA Members and Friends,

The Sierra Delta Section is busy getting ready for our next conference on February 5 with the generous support of the Shasta County Office of Education. We hope to reenergize school personnel who have been struggling with the aftereffects of the Pandemic with some inspiring strategies for getting students back to school and back to mental health. Even though schools are no longer closed, the impact of the Pandemic is still seen with higher levels of chronic absenteeism and habitual truancy. The social isolation of the Pandemic is still impacting students who need the right approach by school personnel to be welcomed into the school community again.

One of the presentations that I particularly recommend will be by Amir Alavi from the Southern Section of CASCWA. For many years, Amir has been a great leader for Riverside County and the rest of the state in infusing restorative practices in the SARB process. Amir helped Riverside County become the county with the most Model



SARBs using exemplary restorative practices, even with the most persistent cases of habitual truancy. Amir has many tips about how to communicate with students and families who are in crisis may seem to be beyond the reach of the school community. These families are often the source of great frustration for school personnel because they are not cooperating with interventions intended to benefit the children, but Amir has many suggestions besides resorting to a regular court. The irony of Amir's approach is that he is a legal expert who was in charge of legal interventions for habitual truancy in Riverside County but developed other approaches which he prefers to implement whenever possible, Introducing students to the traditional criminal justice system must be a last resort.

Amir also uses a restorative approach when implementing peer courts for older students who are habitual truants or who have violated serious Education Code laws. With more traditional or punitive practices unsuccessful, restorative justice practices can help transform a school climate when implemented effectively. Over the years under Amir's leadership, more schools in Riverside County modified their attendance and discipline policies to become more effective. Since attendance and behavior problems have continued to challenge school districts statewide, Amir's approach is more critical than ever before for building relationships, conflict resolution, and social and emotional learning. The growing acceptance of Amir's approach has come after years of changes in California law aimed at reducing the number of suspensions and expulsions which exclude students from school. Exclusionary practices have been particularly harmful to Black students and students with special needs.

For restorative justice to work, the entire school community must support them and believe in their promise, and the way they are implemented is critical to success. Amir will provide the details of implementation that are critical.

Another presentation that will demonstrate how to implement restorative practice principles is by Janet Rowse of Drug Free Clubs of America. Student mental health and school climate have been impacted by the Pandemic, causing many struggling students to avoid school and experiment with drugs. Drug Free Clubs of America are known for encouraging students to take responsibility for themselves, help parents feel comfortable having more open conversations with their kids, and provide the tools to foster positive peer pressure around substance abuse. Janet Rowse will show participants how to activate the program at your school using six simple steps. Students have quit drug use so that they can be restored to a positive school culture that draws them in and gives them a compelling reason to find alternatives to drug use.

Promoting a substance-free environment in schools helps create a culture that encourages students to engage in healthier activities and find alternatives to drug use. This can contribute to a more supportive and conducive learning environment, fostering academic success and personal development.





Mr. Steele's resume includes serving as a police sergeant/SWAT Team Leader, a Consultant II for the Division of Student Services at the Los Angeles County Office of Education, and as the Director of Student Services in two school districts. He is an expert in campus safety planning/response.

This link includes the following Education Code Statement: (d) The comprehensive school safety plan may be evaluated and amended, as needed, by the school safety planning committee, <u>but shall</u> <u>be evaluated at least once a year</u>, to ensure that the comprehensive school safety plan is properly implemented. An updated file of all safety-related plans and materials shall be readily available for inspection by the public.

This presentation will assist you in evaluating your district's safe school plans. It will focus on the key components and will help you in your annual evaluation process! Tom will also point you in the direction of several "Safe School Planning Resources!"

#### PREPARING FOR AND WORKING THROUGH! INCIDENT RESPONSE

Our second presentation will be a panel presentation focusing on a real incident by actual responders to the incident. It will focus on the preparations that were in place, the actual incident response and the aftermath that occurred.

<u>Incident description</u>: The incident began at lunch time on Halloween Day, when a father took his daughter's 1st grade teacher hostage in the classroom. The incident lasted well into the evening, when he was shot by the SWAT team. The incident included lockdown during lunchtime, evacuation, coordination of student transportation to a safe site, coordinating water and lunches for students and staff, and re-unification with parents, all the while coordinating with 1st responders from RPD, RSD, FBI, Fire, and the Secret Service. Also, key to the incident management was what took place in the days and weeks following.

<u>The Presenters</u>: There will be three presenters on the panel, Andrew Flores, Tim Walker, and Gary McGuire, Ed.D.

Andy Flores currently serves as Director for the Office of Emergency Management at the University of California, Riverside. Prior to coming to UCR, he served as Assistant Chief for the Public Safety Department at the University of Redlands. Andy spent the bulk of his career with the Riverside Police Department where he rose through the ranks to finish the final years of his leadership in the Department as a Captain overseeing several of the Department's Divisions.

We sincerely hope that at no time in your career, you will face a life or death situation. We do know that following any major incident there will be questions regarding preparation and response. We also know that many responders can look back on an incident with memories today, as vivid as they were on the day of the incident. Dealing with incident aftermath is an essential part of mental health,

Please visit the site and you will find specific information on several bills that may have a direct impact for your district's board policies and administrative regulations. Sooner or later this information may find it's way into your arena and the more knowledge you have, the better.

For this edition of the intercom, we will focus on only five of the seventy-seven slides.



## AB 87 | Pupils: Section 504 Plans

Meetings and Team Meetings Effective January 1, 2024 EC 270

- Grants parents, guardians and LEAs authority to make audio recordings of Section 504 meetings
- Parent, guardian or LEA must notify team members of intent to record meeting at least 24 hours in advance
- If LEA notifies team of intent to record meeting, and parent/guardian objects or refuses to attend meeting because it will be recorded, the meeting shall not be recorded

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## SB 323 | Comprehensive School Safety Plans

Individualized Safety Plans Effective January 1, 2024 EC 32282

- Requires Comprehensive School Safety Plans (CSSP) include adaptations for pupils with disabilities
- Requires annual evaluation of those plans to ensure appropriate adaptations
- Authorizes parents and others to bring a concern about a student's safety to the principal

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## SB 671 | School Safety Plans

Dangerous, Violent, or Unlawful Activities Effective January 1, 2024 EC 32282

- Requires Comprehensive School Safety Plans to include procedures to assess and respond to reports of any dangerous, violent, or unlawful activity that is being conducted or threatened to be conducted:
  - o at the school,
  - o an activity sponsored by the school, or
  - on a school bus serving the school



#### SB 291| Pupil Rights

## Recess Effective July 1, 2024

EC 49056 and 44807.5

- School staff members <u>cannot</u> restrict a student's recess <u>unless</u> there is an immediate threat to the physical safety of the pupil or the physical safety of one or more of the student's peers.
- Recess time allotted:
  - o At least 30 minutes on regular instructional days
  - At least 15 minutes on early release days, as provided and may be provided for one or more periods unless there is a field trip.
- Recess must be held outdoors whenever the weather and air quality permits. If outdoor space is not sufficient, permits recess to be held indoors.

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#### SB 291| Pupil Rights

#### Continued...

- Recess must comply with a student's individualized education program (IEP) or Section 504 Plan
- Requires that, <u>if</u> a student's recess period is denied, school staff
  members make all reasonable efforts to resolve such threats
  and minimize exclusion from recess and encourages school
  staff to implement other means of correction.
- These requirements *do not prohibit* a public school from providing students with snacks during recess

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#### SB 274 | Suspensions and Expulsions

Willful Defiance: Interventions & Supports EC 48900 & 48901.1 Effective July 1, 2024

- Expands the prohibition of suspension of students from Kindergarten to 12th grade for 48900 (k) willful defiance, including charter schools
  - Sunsets July 1, 2029 for students 6th to 12th
- Reiterates use of other means of correction,
- Teachers may suspend from their classroom for EC 48900 (k) for the day of the suspension plus one.

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### SB 274 | Suspensions and Expulsions

#### Continued...

- LEA certificated and classified employees can refer students to school administrators for appropriate and timely in-school interventions or supports via other means of correction for willful defiance,
- School administrators are required to document other means of correction applied in the student's record within five business days.
- School administrators must inform the referring employee, verbally or in writing, what actions were taken or not, and why, by the 5th business day.
- Prohibits a suspension or expulsion from being imposed against a student based solely on the fact that the student is otherwise absent from school activities.

## California 2024 Ballot Proposition



#### Proposition 1: The Behavioral Health Infrastructure Bond Act of 2023

Authorizes \$6.38 billion in general obligation bonds to finance loans or grants for various purposes, including the conversion, rehabilitation, or construction of permanent supportive housing for homeless veterans and others meeting specific criteria, as well as grants for the Behavioral Health Continuum Infrastructure Program.

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
